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PURPOSE OF SECTIONALS

Sectionals identify the top skaters in each province (Ontario having four Sections) for advancement to the next round of qualifying events ultimately leading to Junior Nationals and the Canadian Championships. Sectionals is a skater's first exposure to competitive stream competition, and is to be organized from a technical perspective as closely as possible to the Canadian Championships in terms of rules and competitive experience.

Each Sectionals event is title sponsored by BMO, and may be sponsored locally in accordance with Skate Canada Marketing Guidelines. The planning and execution of each Sectional Championship is delegated to the Section and/or its host committee with support from Skate Canada nationally, and the event is under the technical supervision of a technical representative assigned by the section. Skate Canada provides each section with an orientation kit outlining the responsibilities associated with BMO's involvement.

Sectionals allow the section to feature their talented skaters, train officials and volunteers, recognize sponsors, and provide entertaining skating for audiences at the provincial level.

In accordance with Skate Canada rules, all Sectional events must be completed no later than the first Sunday following November 30 of the current skating year.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The 2011 BMO Skate Canada Sectionals will be conducted in accordance with the regulations as set forth in the Skate Canada Rulebook and CPC Official Regulations.

Rules governing Sectional championships also apply to any sub-sectional or other sectional elimination rounds unless otherwise stated in this announcement.

If there are four or fewer entries (eight or fewer in Quebec) in any Sectional competition, the Section may elect to cancel the competition and may approve the entry of the relevant competitors to the BMO Skate Canada Challenge competition of the same category (if applicable).

ELIGIBILITY TO COMPETE (From Skate Canada Rule 5401)

Entrants in Canadian Championships events, or qualifying events for Canadian Championships shall:

- (1) **ELIGIBLE PERSON STATUS:** Be eligible persons as defined in Skate Canada Rule Book Section 2100.
- (2) **ASSOCIATE MEMBER:** Be Associate members in good standing of the Association.
- (3) **CANADIAN CITIZENSHIP:** Be Canadian citizens within the meaning of the Citizenship Act, RSC 1985. If the individual is not a Canadian citizen, such individual must have permanent resident status and have resided in Canada for at least one year prior to the date of the Championships they wish to enter. Also, if the entrant is of legal age, the entrant must file a declaration to indicate that he intends in good faith to become a Canadian citizen. If the entrant is an alien minor, he and the living parents (or guardians if both parents are deceased) must have also filed a sworn statement with the Chief Executive Officer of Skate Canada that said minor intends to become a citizen as soon as legally possible.

In the case of a pair or an ice dance couple, at least one partner must be a Canadian citizen. The other partner may be a citizen or resident of a country of any other ISU Member and need not reside in Canada.

- (4) **ANTI-DOPING POLICY AND DOPING CONTROL POLICY:** Agree to be subject to Association rules and regulations regarding doping controls, on an announced or unannounced basis, as determined by the Board of Directors from time to time. Such rules and regulations shall be entitled "Skate Canada Anti-Doping Policy and Doping Control Program" and shall be made



available to potential entrants upon request to their Section or the National Office. (See Skate Canada Policies and Procedures.)

QUALIFICATIONS FOR ENTRY (Part of Skate Canada Rule 5402)

- (1) **TEST PREREQUISITES:** Competitors wishing to enter Sectionals and events leading to Sectionals shall have passed the tests as listed in Skate Canada Rule 5404 (see below) before October 1st preceding the Championships. A skater may also be considered qualified having passed a higher test or parts thereof as long as the minimum test requirement is fulfilled. For example, a skater who has completed the Junior Free Program but no other competitive test parts is considered eligible for the Novice category also if other eligibility requirements are also met.
- (2) **AGE PREREQUISITES:** Competitors wishing to enter Sectionals and events leading to Sectionals shall meet the age requirements to compete as listed in Rule 5404 (see below).
- (3) **COMPETING IN SINGLES AT SECTIONALS:** A skater may compete in Singles events only in the Championships of the Section in which his home club is a member.
- (4) **COMPETING IN PAIR, FOUR OR DANCE AT SECTIONALS:** A pair, four or dance team composed of skaters having clubs in different Sections may enter the group event of the Sectional Championships of any one, but only one, of the Sections represented by its members. The Chair of each Section concerned must be advised as to which championship the group will enter.

ENTRY INFORMATION

The host Section/Club must verify the eligibility of all competitors according to Rule 5401 and submit the names and registration numbers of all competitors entering Canadian Championship qualifying events to the National Office of the Association immediately after the closing date of entries and no later than October 3rd or the next business day following that date.

The eligibility of all entries must be verified by the Section in consultation with the Skate Canada national office.

Note - all skaters must visit the Skate Canada Members Only site to update their “skaters profile”.

RESTRICTIONS TO ENTRY (Part of Skate Canada Rule 5403)

(1) JUNIOR NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS:

- (a) **COMPETING IN THE SAME EVENT DISCIPLINE:** No one shall compete in the same discipline (Singles, Pairs, Dance) in the same event (Novice) at Junior Nationals more than three times.
- (b) **WINNER OF AN EVENT DISCIPLINE:** The winner or the winning pair or dance couple of an event discipline shall not be eligible for the same event discipline again.

TEST AND AGE PREREQUISITES FOR COMPETING (Part of Skate Canada Rule 5404)

(1) PRE-NOVICE EVENTS:

- (a) **SINGLES:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Pre-Novice Competitive Singles Test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement
- (b) **PAIRS:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Pre-Novice Competitive Pair test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement.
- (c) **DANCE:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Pre-Novice Competitive Dance test and the complete Senior Bronze Dance test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement.

(2) NOVICE EVENTS:

- (a) **SINGLES:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Novice Competitive Singles test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement.



- (b) **PAIRS:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Novice Competitive Pair test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement.
- (c) **DANCE:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Novice Competitive Dance test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement

(3) JUNIOR EVENTS:

- (a) **SINGLES:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Junior Competitive Singles Test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** Shall meet ISU Junior age criteria (maximum age limit only applies).
- (b) **PAIRS:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Junior Competitive Pair Test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement.
- (c) **DANCE:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Junior Competitive Dance Test or higher.
 - (ii) **AGE:** Shall meet ISU Junior age criteria (maximum age limit only applies).

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(4) SENIOR EVENTS:

- (a) **SINGLES:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Senior Competitive Singles Test.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement.
- (b) **PAIRS:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Senior Competitive Pair Test.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement.
- (c) **DANCE:**
 - (i) **TEST:** Must have passed the Senior Competitive Dance Test.
 - (ii) **AGE:** No age requirement.

SELECTION OF ENTRIES FROM 13 BMO SKATE CANADA SECTIONALS TO WESTERN AND EASTERN CHALLENGE EVENTS, JUNIOR NATIONALS AND CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS (Part of Skate Canada Rules 7403, AND 7407)

(1) PRE-NOVICE, NOVICE AND JUNIOR SKATERS TO SKATE CANADA WESTERN OR EASTERN CHALLENGE:

- (a) **PRE-NOVICE, NOVICE & JUNIOR EVENTS EXCEPT QUEBEC:** Pre-Novice, Novice and Junior competitors who place first, second, third and fourth in each of the Sectional qualifying events, except Quebec Section, may be selected to represent the Section in the respective Skate Canada Challenge competition, but the selection of fewer than four entries shall be at the discretion of the Section Executive.
- (b) **PRE-NOVICE, NOVICE AND JUNIOR EVENTS IN QUEBEC:** Pre-Novice, Novice and Junior competitors who place first through eighth in the Quebec Sectional qualifying event, may be selected to represent the Section in the respective Skate Canada Challenge competition, but the selection of fewer than eight entries shall be at the discretion of the Section Executive.

(2) SENIOR SKATERS TO CHALLENGE:

- (a) **ALL SENIOR EVENTS:** Senior competitors who place first, second, third and fourth (first through eighth inclusive in Quebec) in the Sectional qualifying event, may be selected by the relevant Section to represent the Section in the Challenge competition without further qualification.
- (b) **COMPETITORS REGISTERED FOR SECTIONALS:** Competitors who register for an event(s) at Sectionals and who in the same competitive season have been awarded a Junior Grand Prix, Senior Grand Prix or Senior International assignment, shall be granted an automatic entry into the Challenge event for each event discipline in which such competitor was registered at Sectionals.

Competitors who register for the Senior events at Sectionals, and have been assigned a Senior Grand Prix or Junior Grand Prix Final event shall be granted an automatic entry into the Senior Challenge event of the same discipline in the same competitive season.

- (c) **SENIOR AUTOMATIC BYES:** Senior competitors who placed first, second or third at the previous Canadian Championships will be granted an automatic entry into the Canadian Championships.

(3) BYED SKATERS:

Those who have been granted byes through Sectional qualifying events (see *Byes Policy in Policies and Procedures*) may enter their Skate Canada Challenge event or Canadian Championship event applicable without further qualification.

These competitors must complete the Sectionals registration process.

(4) **ALTERNATES:**

The next placed competitor in each Sectional event may be nominated as an alternate entry and may replace an entrant who has withdrawn before the start of the event.

SELECTION OF ENTRIES FROM BMO SKATE CANADA CHALLENGE COMPETITIONS TO JUNIOR NATIONALS AND CANADIANS (Part of Skate Canada Rule 7407)

- (1) **FINAL RESULT:** The final result in each Skate Canada Western or Eastern Challenge event shall determine the competitors eligible to enter the equivalent Canadian Championships or Junior National Championships event as follows:
- (a) **NOVICE:** The Skate Canada Novice Challenge is entitled to enter the top 18 placed Singles in each of the Men's and Women's events, 12 placed Pair and 15 placed Dance competitors, which include any byes awarded in each respective event, at the Junior National Skating Championships in the same skating season.
 - (b) **JUNIOR:** The Skate Canada Junior Challenge is entitled to enter the top 18 placed Singles in each of the Men's and Women's events, 12 placed Pair and 15 placed Dance competitors, which include any byes awarded in each respective event, at the Junior National Skating Championships in the same skating season.
 - (c) **SENIOR:**
 - (i) **SENIOR SINGLES:** The maximum number of competitors in the Senior singles events shall be 18. Such entries shall be filled in accordance with subsection (e) below.
 - (ii) **SENIOR PAIR:** The maximum number of competitors in the Senior Pairs event shall be 12. Such entries shall be filled in accordance with subsection (e) below.
 - (iii) **SENIOR DANCE:** The maximum number of competitors in the Senior Dance events shall be 15. Such entries shall be filled in accordance with subsection (e) below.
 - (d) **DETERMINING SENIOR ENTRIES:** The Senior events at the Canadian Championships shall be filled in accordance with the following priority until such time as the maximum number of competitors for the relevant event has been reached:
 - (i) firstly, those competitors who have received an automatic or individual bye;
AND
 - (ii) the balance of the entries shall be determined in accordance with the results of the Skate Canada Senior Challenge event, as applicable.



- (e) **ALTERNATES:** The entry with the next highest score from the applicable Challenge event may replace an entrant at Junior Nationals or Canadians who has withdrawn before the start of an event.
- (f) **NORMAL QUOTA AT JUNIOR NATIONALS AND CANADIANS NOT EXCEEDED:** When the normal quota at Junior Nationals or Canadians is not exceeded (i.e. 18 for Singles, 12 for Pair and 15 for Dance) after the total number of eligible entries from the Western and Eastern Challenge are combined, that event will be held, but may not be compulsory at either Challenge Competition even if the maximum event quota at one of the Challenge competitions is exceeded.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR EVENTS - BMO SKATE CANADA SECTIONALS (Part of Skate Canada Rules 5301, 5302, 5303 and 5304)

- (1) **PRE-NOVICE EVENTS:** Pre-Novice events shall consist of the four competitions as set forth below:
 - (a) **PRE-NOVICE WOMEN'S SINGLES AND PRE-NOVICE MEN'S SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIP:** These competitions shall consist of two parts:
 - (i) **SHORT PROGRAM:** A short program to music which shall not exceed 2 minutes, 30 seconds in duration containing the group of elements announced by Skate Canada for the current season. The groups and requirements shall be as listed on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
 - (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free skating program to music of 3.0 minutes (+ or – 10 sec) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
 - (b) **PRE-NOVICE PAIRS CHAMPIONSHIP:** This competition will consist of two parts:
 - (i) **SHORT PROGRAM:** A short program to music which shall not exceed 2 minutes, 40 seconds in duration containing the group of elements announced by Skate Canada for the current season. The groups and requirements shall be as listed on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
 - (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free skating program to music of 3.0 minutes (+ or - 10 seconds) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
 - (c) **PRE-NOVICE DANCE CHAMPIONSHIP:** This competition will consist of two parts:
 - (i) **COMPULSORY DANCES:** The two compulsory dances drawn for Sectionals are European Waltz and Rocker Foxtrot.
 - **Challenge:** Keats Foxtrot and Harris Tango

The five pieces of music will be played during practice in numerical order. The last (sixth) tune of the dance shall be only used during the warm-up of each starting group.

- (ii) **FREE DANCE:** A free dance to music of 2 minutes 30 seconds (+/- 10 sec) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.

(2) **NOVICE EVENTS:** Novice events shall consist of the four competitions as set forth below:

- (a) **NOVICE WOMEN'S SINGLES AND NOVICE MEN'S SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIP:** These competitions shall consist of two parts:

- (i) **SHORT PROGRAM:** A short program to music which shall not exceed 2 minutes, 30 seconds in duration containing the group of elements announced by Skate Canada for the current season. The groups and requirements shall be as shall be as listed on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
- (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free skating program to music. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.

The length of the program is as follows:

WOMEN: 3.0 minutes (+ or -10 seconds)

MEN: 3.5 minutes (+ or -10 seconds)

- (b) **NOVICE PAIRS CHAMPIONSHIP:** This competition shall consist of two parts:

- (i) **SHORT PROGRAM:** A short program to music which shall not exceed 2 minutes, 40 seconds in duration containing the group of elements as listed in the Technical Handbook. The groups and requirements shall be as listed on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
- (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free skating program to music of 3.5 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.

- (c) **NOVICE DANCE CHAMPIONSHIP:** This competition shall consist of two parts:

- (i) **COMPULSORY DANCES:** The two compulsory dances drawn for Sectionals are:
Blues and Quickstep
 - **Challenge:** Blues and Westminster Waltz
 - **Junior Nationals:** Paso Doble and Westminster Waltz

The five pieces of music will be played during practice in numerical order. The last (sixth) tune of the dance shall be only used during the warm-up of each starting group.



- (ii) **FREE DANCE:** A free dance to music of 3.0 minutes (+ or - 10 seconds) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.

(3) **JUNIOR EVENTS:** Junior events shall consist of the four competitions set forth below:

(a) **JUNIOR WOMEN'S SINGLES AND JUNIOR MEN'S SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIP:** These competitions shall consist of two parts:

- (i) **SHORT PROGRAM:** A short program which shall not exceed 2 minutes, 50 seconds in duration containing the elements to music shall be as listed on the Skate Canada Members Only section of the website.
- (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free skating program to music. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website. The length of program is as follows:

WOMEN: 3.5 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds)

MEN: 4.0 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds)

(b) **JUNIOR PAIRS CHAMPIONSHIP:** This competition shall consist of two parts:

- (i) **SHORT PROGRAM:** A short program which shall not exceed 2 minutes, 50 seconds in duration, containing the elements to music shall be as listed on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
- (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free skating program to music of 4.0 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.

(c) **JUNIOR DANCE CHAMPIONSHIP:** This competition shall consist of two parts:

- (i) **SHORT DANCE:** A short dance to music of 2 minutes 50 seconds (+ or – 10 seconds) in duration. A dance created by an ice dance couple to dance music with designated rhythm(s) and/or theme(s) selected annually by the Technical Committee. The requirements for this program are listed in relevant ISU Communications (e.g.1621).
- (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free dance to music of 3.5 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are listed in relevant ISU Communications (e.g.1610).



- (4) **SENIOR EVENTS:** Senior events shall consist of the four competitions set forth below:
- (a) **WOMEN'S SINGLES AND MEN'S SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIP:** These competitions shall consist of two parts:
 - (i) **SHORT PROGRAM:** A short program which shall not exceed 2 minutes, 50 seconds in duration containing the elements to music shall be as listed on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
 - (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free skating program to music. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.

The length of the program is as follows:
WOMEN: 4.0 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds)
MEN: 4.5 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds)
 - (b) **PAIR SKATING CHAMPIONSHIP:** This competition shall consist of two parts:
 - (i) **SHORT PROGRAM:** A short program which shall not exceed 2 minutes, 50 seconds in duration containing the elements to shall be as listed on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
 - (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free skating program to music of 4.5 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are available on the Members Only section of the Skate Canada website.
 - (c) **DANCE CHAMPIONSHIP:** This competition shall consist of two parts:
 - (i) **SHORT DANCE:** A short dance to music of 2 minutes 50 seconds (+ or – 10 seconds) in duration. A dance created by an ice dance couple to dance music with designated rhythm(s) and/or theme(s) selected annually by the Technical Committee. The requirements for this program are listed in relevant ISU Communications (e.g.1621).
 - (ii) **FREE PROGRAM:** A free dance to music of 4.0 minutes (+ or – 10 seconds) in duration. The composition of the free program and the requirements for a well-balanced program are listed in relevant ISU Communications (e.g.1610).

REGISTRATION

Registration for skaters, officials and coaches will commence one hour prior to the first official practice at rink # 1 (Palais des sports Léopold-Drolet).



REGISTRATION AND PRACTICE ICE FOR SECTIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS (as per Rule 7406)

- (1) **REGISTRATION:** Competitors at Sectional Championships must register for the competition before their official practice session immediately prior to the first portion of their event.
- (2) **PRACTICE ICE:** Upon registration or attendance at an officially scheduled practice session competitors are not permitted to skate on ice other than the official practice or competition ice as scheduled for the event. Violators of this rule shall be subject to suspension from the competition in question. This rule is applicable to all qualifying events including Regional/Sub-Sectional, Sectional, Skate Canada Western and Eastern Challenge, Junior National Championships, and Canadian Championships.

ACCREDITATION FOR COACHES

By-law 2403 (Skate Canada Policies and Procedures) shall apply.

In order to receive accreditation from Skate Canada at Sectionals, Skate Canada professional coaches must meet the following conditions:

- Be Intermediate STARSkate/Provincial Coach certified
- Be a current Professional Coaching Member of Skate Canada
- Hold a valid First Aid Certificate
- Register in person and show their section photo identification

NEW COACHES: New professional coaches who do not meet the above criteria for accreditation or funding will have three years in which to become Level 2/ISPC Certified and four years to become Level 3 Certified from the date of registering as a Skate Canada Professional Coach.

Two coaches per entry will be accredited. Only two people will be allowed at ice level – determined by the skater/team.

JUDGING SYSTEM

The Cumulative Points Calculation (CPC) Judging System will be used for Pre-Novice, Novice, Junior and Senior event categories.

MUSIC

All music used must be in the public domain or covered by the Performing Rights Society.

Competitors who have music composed especially for their programs, either in wholly or in part, shall be responsible for obtaining a written release from the composer for the use of such music on radio and television, or appropriate clearance from the Performing Rights Society.



For the information of Dance competitors: The ISU compulsory dance music to be used for all practices and events is the 2001 Revised Version produced by the ISU.

Music Requirements

Each entry must provide two CDs for the competition upon registration. One for competition (marked "Master") and one for back up (marked "copy"). Music will be retained at the rink.

Standard Specifications for CDs

1. Only one program shall be recorded on each CD.
2. The start of the music shall be recorded on the CD with less than two seconds of lead in.
3. Competitor's name followed by music time (not skating time) shall be clearly printed on the CD.
4. Each CD shall be enclosed in its plastic container marked with the skater's name, event and total music time.

AWARDS

Standard Skate Canada Sectional medals will be presented to the top three finishers of each event. In the case of only two entries, each entry shall be awarded a prize. In the case of only one entry in an event an exhibition shall be performed but no prize shall be awarded.
